Dear Parents and Carers,

Thank you to those parents who attended our very successful P&F Meeting on Wednesday night. There was much discussion around changes happening around the College and future directions. Save the date of the Term 4 meeting (24 October) in your diary, as it would be wonderful to have your opinion contribute to the discussion.



DEVELOPMENT OF THE KIRK STREET CAMPUS:

The development on our other campus is rapidly gathering momentum. At present we have five classrooms on that site and by the beginning of next year there will be ten.

By Week 8 of this term the Maths department will move off the site and move into classrooms at the primary school. It is through the generosity of the staff at Our Lady of Dolours that we will have the use of five classrooms. This means there will be no disruption to the learning of Mercy students.

CHANGES TO OUR 1:1 DEVICE PROGRAMME FOR YEAR 10 (2019):

If your daughter is currently in Year 9 the warranty for her Chromebook expires at the end of this year and you need to make the decision about what device she will use when she is in Year 10. You will have three choices: keep the current device, purchase a new Chromebook or she can bring her own device (BYOD).

The third option has become available due to a change in the Catholic Schools Office policy and at this stage is only a trial for Year 10, 2019.

All Year 10 parents should have by now received an email outlining the options in more detail.

YEARS 11 AND 12 PARENTS:

With the Year 12 Graduation fast approaching we are looking for support from our <u>Year 11 parents</u> to host the Graduation afternoon tea. It is a tradition at Mercy that Year 11 parents host the event as they will be given the same hospitability next year with their daughters. <u>Year 12 parents</u> are asked to help us with catering by letting us know how many family members will be attending. Please see the information from the P&F President, Tina Teixeira later in this newsletter which gives you the links to the Trybooking sites to let us know numbers coming.

PLENARY COUNCIL 2020:

Pope Francis has invited the Australian church to dialogue so that our Bishops have an understanding of the issues that face our contemporary church. The Australian Catholic Bishops have therefore announced the decision to hold a Plenary Council in 2020. Archbishop of Brisbane Mark Coleridge said that "the Church is not the presence in our society it once was. We need to take a measure of that and make decisions accordingly."

To provide feedback to the Plenary Council, 2018 has been nominated as a year of dialogue. You are invited to have your say to the question "what do you think God is asking of us in Australia at this time?" To facilitate this, parishes and schools are giving their communities the opportunity to discuss the question and provide our response to the Bishops. At Mercy College we will be holding a session of listening and dialogue for parents on Wednesday 24 October. Save the date.

Mercy Week 2018

Mercy Week is a strong tradition at our College and it continues to be the favourite part of the year for our community. It is a time when we celebrate the Feast Day of our foundress Catherine McAuley, reflect on our Mercy Charism and live out the Mercy values of our school through fundraising and outreach activities.

Through knowing Catherine's story we come to understand why as a young women she had such a deep sense of social justice. Catherine knew what it was like to be poor having lost her father and mother at a young age. She herself experienced personal poverty and knew what it was like to be homeless, to be hungry and to receive the mercy of others.



Catherine was also a deeply spiritual women who centred her life on God. She was inspired by the Gospel of Jesus and the mercy he showed to the poor and the marginalised. When Catherine inherited a large sum of money which is estimated to be the equivalent of \$7 million dollars today she used it to build the House of Mercy, a refuge for women and children. Catherine loved the poor, and would say that "the poor deserve the best".

Catherine is a role model to us all, she embodied what it means to be a women of mercy. During Mercy Week, we are called to live out these values, to be women who show respect to one another, be women of compassion, women who act with integrity, women who strive for excellence and welcome those who we encounter with hospitality and kindness.

Mercy Week is the time for us be like Catherine, to be merciful and show love to the poor and continue the work of the Mercy Sisters in our community.




Bishop's Art Prize 2018 Winners

I am delighted to announce that two of our finalists were successful in receiving Diocesan Awards for Stage 4 in the Bishops Religious Art Prize for 2018.

Honourable Mention was awarded to Arleia V. for her illuminated scripture passage from the Gospel of John "I am the true vine and my father is the gardner" (Jn 15:1).

First Prize was awarded to Caitlyn M. for her illuminated scripture passage from the Gospel of Mark "Do not be afraid". I would like to share Caitlyn's reflection on the scripture:

I chose this bible verse, as I believe it perfectly captures the moment when we realise how powerful God and Jesus are and how they can influence our lives to benefit us in a positive way. The verse is conveying how we must have a strong faith in God. In the passage the disciples did not have enough faith in Jesus to believe he would save them from the storm.



The waves in the artwork represent the rough moments in our lives that we feel can often swamp us. The boat represents us as disciples of Christ, and that though our journey of life, especially the hard times, Jesus is by our side to accompany us and save us from the wild storms and seas.

It is an expectation that all parents of students in Years 7 and 8 attend.

ThinkUKnow is a free, evidence-based cyber safety program that provides presentations to Australian parents, carers and teachers and students. They will provide you with information on the technologies that your daughter uses, the challenges she may face, and importantly, how they can be overcome.

On this evening the aim is to provide you with the tools to create a safer online environment for your daughter. Presentations will cover what young people $\underline{\sf SAY}$, $\underline{\sf SEE}$ and $\underline{\sf DO}$ online.

The presentation will cover topics such as social media reputation management, cyberbullying, 'sexting', online grooming, online gaming, inappropriate content, privacy management, identity theft, how to protect your devices, and how to report matters when things go wrong.

If the shoe fits. . .

Year 9 students were recently charged with the task of creating their own contribution to an exhibition called 'If the shoe fits'. Their pieces demonstrated their skills in appropriating, transforming or adapting traditional fairy tales for a modern audience. Many of the works were drawing on the Disney films about princesses, such as The Little Mermaid, as well as traditional fairy tales like Rapunzel.

Very clearly, there were messages about empowerment and strength. Many pieces

examined the idea that a woman should be judged according to her character rather than her appearance. Year 9 students don't want to be princesses but be powerful, intelligent young women in charge of their own destiny and not wait for a prince.

From cakes to castles, song books, memes, dating site profiles and lots of shoes (and not of the glass kind), Year 9 English students certainly showed their skills in creativity and collaboration.

YEAR 9 ENGLISH EXCURSION - WHICH WAY HOME



On Monday the 30th of June, Year 9 travelled to the Seymour Centre and watched the ILBIJERRI Theatre Company perform 'Which Way Home'. ILBIJERRI Theatre Company tells stories about what it means to be Indigenous in Australia today. The play was amusing and moving. The writer and actor, Katie Beckett, drew on her memories of growing up with her single Aboriginal father.

The story follows a young woman named Tash who takes her father on a road trip back 'home'. The flashbacks interestingly showed the ups and downs of growing up as an Aboriginal girl in a predominantly white area. A scene that stuck with many of us was when Tash was scolded by her father for getting muddy in front of the white children because he was scared that people would think he couldn't look after her. This helped us realise how severe discrimination can be in Australia.

Overall this performance created an uplifting and touching experience for all of us and opened our eyes to the Aboriginal culture and hardships that they have faced in our contemporary society. The daughter and father relationship conveyed in the play provoked laughter, joy and sympathy in us all, as well as allowing us to make connections to our own lives.

It was a fun and engaging way to tell a true story and was different to anything most of Year 9 had seen before. It was performed on a small stage and cleverly used space, lighting and props to tell a story that warmed all of our hearts.

Year 9 thoroughly enjoyed the performance by the ILBIJERRI Theatre Company and it has inspired us to love everyone for who they are and to appreciate those who do lots for us. We look to further study of Indigenous Stories and the role of media in shaping our understanding of Indigenous issues later in the year.



Mercy Cricket wants you for our second cricket team!!

Since our first game, two years ago, our highlights have included:

- having the best ranked fielding team
- having the second highest wicket taker
- coming third out of ten teams
- reaching the semi finals in our first season
- we are very close to having a second Mercy team but need more girls to play for this to happen. The following are some details to help you.

My daughter has never played cricket before. Will she be out of her depth?	No not at all. No experience is necessary. When we started in 2016, ten of the girls had not played cricket before.
Do I need to purchase any equipment?	No. Mercy Cricket will provide bats, pads, gloves, helmets etc. If you want to use your own equipment, then that is fine too!
What is the format of the game?	We play 9-a-side T20 cricket against other teams. Everyone must bowl and at Mercy we always try to ensure everyone has a bat as well.
When and where are the games played?	The games are played on a Saturday afternoon, normally at 1pm. However, we have played some 2pm games. Games are played on the North Shore.
How long is a season?	The spring season runs from mid-October to early-December. The Summer season runs from End of January to Mid-March.
How safe will my daughter be whilst playing cricket?	Very safe! Its mandatory to wear cricket helmets when batting and wicket keeping. Also, pads and gloves must be worn.
When is training and who trains the team?	Training is once a week normally at 5pm. Mercy has three qualified coaches to train the girls.


